

Sports Premium Funding

2022 - 2023

This academic year Woodcroft Primary School will receive £7288 for 2022/23 and carry forward £14393.79 from 2021/22. This gives a total sports premium of: £21,681.79.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport you offer.

This means that you should use the premium to:

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that your school already offers
- build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Action	Spending	Intended outcome	Actual Outcome
Employment of Mr Brown – All day Tuesdays and Monday afternoons to work alongside teachers to deliver various sports activities.	£6500	To up skill the teaching of games across the Year groups. Allow teachers to benefit from working with specialists. Different sports mapped out with PE lead to ensure varied coverage. This includes an after school club that will circulate sports and Year Groups.	Mr Brown has worked closely with all teachers across the Year on games lessons. He has helped deliver hockey, basketball, football, badminton and multi-sports to children of all ages. He works closely with the teachers to ensure lessons are progressive and teach a range of skills. In addition, he runs varied sports clubs on a Monday and Tuesday which have supported a range of ages.
Additional swimming lessons for Years 3, 4 and 5.	£4600	These additional lessons are to help prepare children for achieving end of Year 6 target in swimming. More importantly swimming is an essential skill that all children should have the opportunity to learn. (Year 6 lessons are funded from the curriculum budget)	These are an important part of the curriculum and often the first opportunity for many of our children to learn to swim. Across the 6 week block children build confidence as well as technique.
Continuation of forest school activities in conjunction with the Acorn centre at Billy's lake. Develop orienteering and outdoor skills.	Estimated £1400	The cost is currently estimated but may include a range of suitable outdoor clothes and equipment. These skills will help build teamwork and awareness of the local environment. Offers angling and outdoor skills.	This is predominately taught in Year 4 and children attend for 3x half terms with half the class and then this switches to the other half of the class. In addition, we provide Forest school opportunities for targeted children with different needs on our site. This is an area of the curriculum that allows pupils to demonstrate different skills than they would in the classroom.
PE equipment	£2000	New PE equipment required to ensure all sports are adequately covered – e.g. Hockey sticks, table tennis bats, balls, tennis rackets, and badminton nets.	This has allowed the purchase of different sports equipment such as badminton racquets and nets which give the children different sports experiences.

Playground equipment	£2000	Review of lunchtime equipment. This needs updating every year. Alternative sports equipment for lunch time to support different development of skills rather than just football. Giant chess, scooters, pogo sticks, skipping ropes, wheelie trays and go-karts. (Fixed equipment to be updated through capital). Each class needs their own supply due to Covid.	The total spend was £1108 on new ropes, scooters, hoops and balls. This will need to be a continuous investment to ensure pupils have break and lunch time activities.
School sponsored Sports Kit	£1000	This needs to focus on providing outdoor kit for children to ensure that they do not miss out on sports through the Winter. Team sports kit supplemented through local sponsorship.	This was donated and did not cost anything.
Every class gymnastics trip	£2100	Portsmouth gymnastic centre offers children the opportunity to experience gymnastics in a purpose built arena. Inspiring pupils to try a different sport.	The gymnastics centre changed its rules after Covid and these trips have not been possible.
Subsidised Karate lessons for up to 20 pupils.	£3900	Uptake in Karate has been poor and to encourage children to do it we are going to subsidise 20 places.	This has been a success with more than 20 children now attending. We are only charged a maximum of 20 places.
New sports markings on playground/field	£600	New markings to support introduction of new games.	This allows for different games to be played and also supports sports day practice.
Football in the community	£2730	Subsidised sports club with Hawks football club.	We have 12 children that attend Hawks free of charge and this resulted in 10 of them experiencing their first football tournament that was arranged by Hawks.

This leaves a deficit of £5148.21. This will be funded through the wider school budget. The total actually spent was £23,330
